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

Description: Believe in the Sign is about a damp corner of England where nothing much

but everything happens. It is a 'sort of a memoir' of a normal, average boy who would have grown up happily average and normal but for a dark and perverse passion: the seductive lure of masochistic devotion to a no-hope, near-derelict football club. But it isn't all joyously uplifting. Swimming through the murk is a swarm of snapshots that bring growing up in the 1970s and 1980s into startling focus. Mad kids and sad kids and good kids from broken homes; teenage wrecking parties; pub brawls; long existential marches along the motorway banking; the baiting of Elton John and a club chairman caught playing 'away from home.' ABOUT THE BOOK:

How does it feel to be an Israeli living in a country where he is constantly under the threat of becoming wounded or killed by shots fired at his car or being blown up in a suicide attack -- when taking a bus to go to work in the morning, when sitting in a restaurant enjoying a pizza, when participating in a festive event like the Passover Seder in the dining hall of a big hotel in a holiday resort next to the Mediterranean? Will he become more extreme in his political views? Will he want to exterminate the perpetrators of these crimes? Will he want to drive them into the sea?

On the other hand: How does it feel being a Palestinian living in poverty and under occupation, not only the Israeli one? The Blood Marriage tells of the love story between a new immigrant from Russia to Israel and a beautiful young Palestinian woman, which tries to give some answers to these and similar questions.

The Blood Marriage tells of the love between two people who actually wouldn't really meet under the circumstances related -- and who, hopefully, will never meet under these conditions.

In addition to these two protagonists *Blood Marriage* mirrors the large variety of men and women peopling this narrow strip of land called Israel and Palestine, respectively. The most differing kinds of persons express their opinions, tell their life story, showing how painfully tortuous the road to peace still is.



On Hokkaido, the northernmost isle of Japan, embedded in the midst of hills and active vulcanoes, is Toya-ko, a vulcanic lake. Three minuscule islands pop out of its centre, they are the last visible tops of a mountain. The shores around Toya-ko are fertile land, as are the slopes of the vulcanoes. Little wonder then that both have attracted lots and lots of farmers.

Not only farmers are, however, attracted by this land high up in Japan's North, also artists have come to settle in these serene surroundings. One of them is Fumio Iwasaki, a painter. He gave up his safe existence as a school teacher in Sapporo in order to fully dedicate himself to his passion, painting. He is supported in his endeavours by Aiko, his wife. After a stay at an artists's house in Northern Germany Fumio Iwasaki suffers a stroke on his return home. Following his death, his wife decides to also set up an artists' house in memory of her late artist husband.

Thanks to the help of her good friends Yoshio Nomura, the director of the Ainu Museum in Sapporo, and his wife Mineko, Aiko Iwasaki is able to realize her dream. Every year two to three artists come to stay at Aiko's artists' house. One of these guests is Avital Shai, not really an artist, but rather a freelance journalist.

During the bear's festival at the Ainu village of Shiraoi, Yoshio and Avital become lovers. Soon afterwards, Avital has to go back to Europe. They are, however, not separated for long because later on she accompanies him on his expeditions to far-off lands all over the world. In addition, Avital keeps returning to Aiko Iwasaki and her artists' house.

Their happiness apparently awakens the jealousy of Nakajima, who according to the Ainu, is the embodiment of Evil watching the entrance to the World of the Dead which is at the top of the highest elevation of the biggest island of the same name in Toya-ko. Yoshio's wife Mineko becomes jealous of his affair, forgetting her good manners as a dutiful Japanese wife with the result that Yoshio thinks of divorcing her. He asks Avital to marry him. She will not answer him. But their relation is finished. It is as if the colour had gone out of their world, everything becoming grey and dull. Grey are the mountains, grey is the colour of the lake, and the future of the lovers has also become grey.

In the end, Yoshio's dilemma to decide which of the two women he would like to live with is resolved practically by itself.

ABOUT THE BOOK:

One day in the middle of May in the nineties, Santiago de Chile. For weeks the verdict of the Supreme Court against the former leader of the secret service is anticipated, and today will be the day. For the former German journalist Karola Philipp this day is thus "One of those Chilean days", that bring up memories of the times, when the ubiquitous state-terror ruled the lives of the people, also that of Karola and her husband Ricardo, witch was "run through the mill" several times but still wouldn't go into exile.

A few years ago the country retuned to democracy but ex-dictator Augusto Pinochet still holds all the wires as supreme commander of the army. To put the people responsible on trial, an atonement of the crimes is therefore difficult.

Karola's thoughts are occupied with the upcoming trial and digress into past times.

Various fates, especially that of her neighbour Dona Regina, who's oldest son Pablo "vanished" after his arrest on the day of the coups d'état and whose younger sons also died violently years later, show Karola the parallels to the German past, which she as an "afterborn" only knows out of history books and recollections of her grand mother: As such the "disappearance" of the Jew Ida Silberstein and her family in November 1938. What remained of Ida was Goethe's "Wahlverwandschaften" with dedication and a quotation of Franz Kafka: "A book has to be the axe for the frozen sea inside us".

Direct connections crop up: After the war many undercover SS-officials "soon found new tasks in the dictatorships of South America." Suspect and contradictory is August Heller, Karola's employer of Austrian origin, who makes no secret about his admiration for Pinochet and who "not only shares his first name but also his hatred about communists with him."

The gardener Rogelio plays a special role, an old idealist and still convinced communist, who comments about the political situation while doing his gardening, and never tires to idolise the gone DDR (East German state) as the "good Germany" and to praise the "fellow Honecker God may save him", while Karola has learned to appreciate the good parts of her "bad" because capitalistic Germany from afar.

At the end of the day the verdict gives although minuscule a hint of justice: Pinochets former torture master is convicted to seven years of prison. "Measly seven years for the murder of a socialist foreign secretary", as Rogelio foreboded. Nearly simultaneously in the neighbouring state Argentina the former SS-Fuehrer Erich Priebke, an old brother in arms of Heller's father, is arrested and extradited to Italy. 40 years he lived as a sausage dealer and president of the German-Argentinean union without being bothered.

Rising from the Ashes is a true and incredible story of a Japanese adolescent, Shinji Mikamo, who miraculously survived the first atomic bombing of human kinds. He was on top of his house roof with nothing to shield him at only 1,200 m from the epicenter in Hiroshima on August 6, 1945 toward the end of World War II. But what made Shinji stand out from most of the survivors of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, or even of many other man-made disasters in our history, he never hated Americans as aggressors. He somehow saw things from a much bigger perspective even in the very strict Japanese military government's mind control of civilians during the war. His daughter Dr. Akiko Mikamo wrote his story to share a survivor's message of love and the power of forgiveness, reminding the world that our worst enemies of yesterday can be our best friends of tomorrow.

August 6, 1945, begins like any other day in Hiroshima during World War II. As nineteen-year-old Shinji Mikamo works on top of his house roof, helping his father prepare their house for the government ordered demolition, there is a blinding flash. As Shinji turns toward "the sun exploded," a fireball sends him into darkness. An atomic bomb has just shattered Hiroshima, only 1,200 meters away, and kills 140,000 civilians.

Left severely injured and burned, Shinji is rescued from the rubble by his father as a fierce fire approaches. As the two wander into their decimated city, Shinji is pushed forward by his father, who refuses to let him give up. They encounter demons and angels in this hell while desperately looking for help. Shinji, who has lost everything, has no idea that pain and hardship will haunt him for decades to come—a miraculous journey that eventually leads him to empathizing with his destroyers.

Three months later, Shinji barely walked to the site where their house used to be and found the heat-fused pocket watch out of the ashes that belonged to his father, who apparently vanished after they parted. It was the only relic that showed his connections to his family and ancestry. Shinji later donated the watch to Hiroshima Peace Museum, which was sent to the UN Head-quarter in NY for the permanent display in 1985. When his daughter, Akiko, visited the UN in 1989, she discovered the watch had been just stolen. There, she learns the true lesson from Shinji's father and Shinji, "When you lose something, you gain something."



Dr. Akiko Mikamo, born in Hiroshima, graduated from Hiroshima University and moved to the USA to obtain a doctor in clinical psychology in San Diego. She is president of San Diego Worldwide Initiative to Safeguard Humanity (www.sdwish.org) and US-Japan Psychological Services (www.usjapanpsych.com).

In 2014 she received the Award for Exceptional Service to World Peace from the World Peace and Prosperity Foundation. She has been giving talks on the topic of the world peace and forgiveness in Japan, US, France, South Africa, Singapore, UK, and other places.



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



The Celestial Café is a collection of the diaries and thoughts of Stuart Murdoch, singer in the band Belle And Sebastian. They stem from the particularly un-rock and roll years of 2002-2006, and are subsequently very light on the subjects of drug taking, orgies and general debauchery.

Mr Murdoch would like you to know that right off the bat. He doesn't even want you to lift the book if that's the kind of thing you're after. Don't even look at it! It's a poncy sort of book. Let's get that straight from the start.

Catherine Smyth is an experienced news editor working for the local paper The Rossendale Free Press. She was the first reporter on the scene of the murder of 20-year-old Sophie Lancaster and her newspaper published the very first account of the attack, before the story was retold on a global scale. She has unrestricted access to police contacts and witnesses.



Description:

Twenty-year-old Sophie Lancaster was kicked to death by a pack of 'feral' youths at her local park in Bacup, Lancashire. Her boyfriend, Rob Maltby, was also set upon and received life-threatening injuries. Their only 'crime' was to dress differently, as 'goths' or 'moshers' in the easy shorthand of the media, which cited the killing as another example of Broken Britain.

Catherine Smyth was the first reporter on the scene and remained at the heart of the story throughout. A mother herself, she writes evocatively of the impact it had on both the Lancaster family and Bacup itself. Smyth has unearthed several anomalies: the police admitted initially attending the wrong park and the ambulance took 14 minutes to travel a distance of a mile in reaching the scene.

While relating the horrific nature of the attack, Smyth also focuses on the good to rise from evil – a town rallying in support of a stricken family, a mother showing incredibly dignity and, most important of all, a campaign launched to inform the world of the grave dangers of intolerance. As one banner carried at a parade in memory of Sophie proclaimed: 'Hate is easy – love takes courage'.


Esther Fairfax: My Improper Mother and Me



Esther Fairfax' father, a naturist, insisted that she remained naked around the house until she was 16. He slept naked with her and she had to dance naked in Paris at the age of 16. She was 'rewarded' with a shilling by her mother Lotte Berk for swallowing during oral sex with a man with whom they were appearing at a local theatre. Esther was raped at the age of 15 by the producer of the show in which her parents were appearing. They told her: "Let's agree to forget about it. We could all lose our jobs."

Esther met her future husband, the poet John Fairfax, at a party hosted by Dylan Thomas. She often fantasized about killing her husband and had an affair with the famous art critic David Sylvester, a great friend of Francis Bacon, and with the 'blue' painter Yves Klein. She tried to kill herself with an overdose of tablets and whisky.





Description:

Lotte Berk was one of the most extraordinary women of our times. She became world famous as the devisor of the Lotte Berk Technique, a revolutionary fitness programme that led her to great fame and wealth during the 1960s and 1970s. Among her students were a swathe of movers and shakers - Britt Ekland, Maureen Lipman, Geraldine McEwan, Zoe Wanamaker, Shirley Conran, Edna O'Brien, Prue Leith and Sian Phillips.

My Improper Mother and Me is a compelling portrait of the outrageous German émigré by her daughter, Esther Fairfax. It reveals the inner workings of a Bohemian life lived to the extreme. Cajoled to dance naked in Paris at the age of 16, Fairfax's remarkable story embraces drug addiction, sexual liberation, poverty, isolation, fame and, finally, hope.

The Improper Mother – Lotte Berk: Born in Germany, Lotte had to flee the Nazis just as her dancing career had taken off. At various points Lotte was addicted to sleeping pills and morphine. She recommended the sleeping pills to Esther, who also became addicted. Lotte had several long-lasting lesbian relationships. She was an anorexic and one of the first in the UK to undergo cosmetic surgery. An operation to replace all her teeth went drastically wrong and she almost died. She turned down a business offer from Vidal Sassoon because she felt he wanted to 'cash in' on her name.

'The miniskirts of Mary Quant and fashions of Biba made women rush to exercise their flabby thighs and bottoms. Sassoon revolutionized hair with his sharp cut styles. Fashion was dictating body shape and mother offered that body shape with her clever exercises. Mother had it all: the miniskirts and high boots, the Sassoon crop. She blossomed, every inch a Chelsea Girl.' – Esther.



He worked in a tannery in Maromme, a suburb of the French port Rouen in Normandy. After the German invasion (May 1940) and the increasing repression by the Nazis, he joined the communist resistance group "Front National". Denounced by a neighbor he fell into the hands of the Gestapo, was imprisoned and deported via the transit camp Compiègne (May 1943) at first to Weimar (June 1943) to the concentration camp Buchenwald. With the re-opening (February 1944) of the camp "DAW Lindenstrasse" in Lublin, in the so-called General Government, he was taken off from Buchenwald to fill it up. When the Red Army reached Lublin (July 1944), his odyssey continued to Auschwitz to the main camp, which also belonged to the DAW.

From the day of his arrest until the evacuation of Lublin, he took every opportunity to send secret and official letters to his wife Hélène. They included everything from handicrafts in order to put secret messages in aid packages to calls for help for bare essentials. But did these things really arrive? And could he actually use them for himself?

Letters to this extent and over such a long period are a historical rarity. Although writing letters was allowed officially, they sometimes were censored and destroyed arbitrary. Based on these letters and documents, witnesses and memories the real events can be reconstructed. Identity cards explain who were the actors. Calendar pages record the historical events. Historic photos confirm the documents and statements. Drawings of the French prisoners Auguste Favier and Pierre Mania give in an oppressive way an account of the daily life in the concentration camp. Jokes from this time convey the spirit of the times and were a part of the resistance. 3-D images of the camp try to reconstruct what no longer exists.

What purpose had concentration camps? How were they organized? What's hidden behind the acronym DAW?

In the 1930's Leo Reuss, a well-known actor from Berlin, immigrated to Vienna. His hopes of being employed were soon destroyed as the interest in Jewish emigrant actors was in no way greater there. 

"My name is Catarina Elisabetha Ludovica Magdalena and I am called vulgairement Bettina." Her letters she often signed with "Bettine".

The invention of her name was her first political deed. At the same time she therewith created her own identity. The 150th anniversary of her death will be on the 20th of January 2009: Bettine (or Bettina) Brentano (or von Arnim), sister of a poet, muse of Goethe, spouse of a poet, grandchild (of the author Sophie La Roche) and much more than this: poetic biographer of her lionised idol Goethe and her school day friend and poet Karoline Günderrode. She is literary executor of the works of her already in 1831 deceased husband Achim von Arnim and fanciful publisher of the letters of her brother Clemens (1844). The 1835 and 1840 published correspondence books make her famous. Now she can be newly discovered as a political publisher and social critic:

With "Dies Buch gehört dem König" (This book belongs to the king) the so called naïve and "romantic poet muse" manages to circumvent censorship, confront the Prussian king Friedrich Wilhelm IV. with the misery of the Silesian weavers and point out social grievances. Another trick to bypass the harsh censorship: Bettine lets Goethes mother, "Mrs. Rath", voice her critique. Included in the work are eye witness accounts about the catastrophic living conditions of spinners and weavers in the slums before the gates of Berlin and the first social reportage in German literature.



She is one of the heroines of the afro-American history and one of the best known women of her time. Schoolbooks tell of her deeds. The first biography, still based on interviews, was written as early as 1869. American biographers compare her with Jeanne d'Arc and Florence Nightingale. Her followers and friends, more than 300 freed slaves, witch she brought as a "conductor" with the "Underground Railroad" via secret passages to the safe northern states and Canada, called her "Moses". This was a reference to her work as scout and spy in the independence war. On dangerous missions she always carried a gun with her. When one of her charges broke down or wanted to return she held the gun at his or hers head: "Go or die!" she said. She was determined to bring all "passengers" to the "land of freedom", even if they themselves lost their courage.


Nothing in the early life of Harriet Tupman (approx. 1820-1913) indicated her later importance: As the young woman, who is working on a plantation in Maryland, hears in 1849 that she shall be sold, she flees. But personal freedom is not enough for her. She is so successful as a slave liberator ("I never lost a passenger"), that the bounty on her head is as high as 40.000 Dollars. For later generations of black US-citizens witch are free, but until the late seventies of the 20th century don't have the same rights as white people Tupman is a exemplary figure of female dignity and militant resistance against racist tyranny.

She demanded "the absolute freedom, nothing but freedom and only freedom". But she knew:

"no freedom without equality! No freedom in a society, which is monopolized in the hands of a few" - this is not only a problem of the 19th century, but, on the contrary, alarmingly relevant to the current situation. Leonhard Abbott recognized her together with Emma Goldmann and Voltairine DeCleyre as "the three most important female anarchists of the modern time"

Only a few decades after her death in 1905 was her significance for the Parisian Commune of 1871 and anarchism "forgotten" by the historians, who only too gladly kept quiet about the accomplishments of women in countless revolutions, despite the fact that in the French revolution of 1789, in the German revolution of 1848 and in the Russian resistance movements women were at the forefront of the action.

Especially the rebellious spirit of a Louise Michel, a fighter against a inhumane capitalistic world which parts people into exploiters and exploited, is much needed in the $21^{\rm st}$ century. Her ideas make Louise Michel, the freedom fighter, to a contemporary for us. Is that the reason why she is known so little?
